OPENING REMARKS BY A CHIEF DIVERSITY, EQUITY & INCLUSION OFFICER

HISPANIC HERITAGE MONTH CELEBRATION, A VIRTUAL EVENT

EXCERPT 1: SPEECH OPENING

As you **came into our event this morning**, you heard a **hit song** by **Pete Rodriguez** called "<u>I Like It Like That</u>."

And even though you only heard <u>a few minutes of this song</u> from 1967, I'll bet it's one of those songs that plays over and over in your head / <u>all day long</u>.

I know it'll stay in my head.

Because every time I hear this song, it takes me back to when I was a kid **going to concerts with my father / in Atlanta**.

<u>My father and I LOVED Latin / jazz!</u>

It was **a bond we shared**.

I remember the <u>stage</u>, the <u>songs</u> and the <u>singers</u> – like <u>Celia Cruz</u> – and <u>musicians</u> like <u>Tito Puente</u>.

I remember the **bass guitar** / **trumpets** / **piano** and **drums**.

Sometimes we got up and danced to the music right where we were!

It was **<u>ALWAYS</u> / <u>a PARTY</u>!**

A <u>CELEBRATION</u>!

And for <u>me</u> / a time of <u>happiness</u> and <u>joy</u>.

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<u>"I Like It Like That" was a song born</u> <u>in a studio / jam session</u>.

This song was written by <u>Manny Rodriguez</u> and <u>Tony Pabon</u>, a <u>composer</u> / <u>singer</u> / and <u>trumpet player</u>.

Pete Rodriguez said this:

" ... I came up with the intro, and somebody else said, 'Let's do this' and 'Let's do that,' and finally we got the whole thing.

"It was a <u>combined effort</u> by <u>everybody</u>."

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That song became <u>a huge hit for Pete</u>, a young man from <u>Puerto Rico</u> who was <u>living in the Bronx</u>.

Soon, he became known as "<u>the pioneer of boogaloo music</u>," <u>which married together</u> / <u>Latin beats</u> with <u>soul beats</u>.

Pete Rodriguez was talented!

He had **an amazing career** because **he kept doing what he did best**.

And he was given the chance to be great.

<u>Here at [our company] / it's the same thing</u>.

We have **<u>the best talent</u>** in the industry!

So we need to help our people / <u>do what they do best</u>.

And give them the chance to be great.

<u>Which brings me back to Pete Rodriguez</u> <u>and the studio jam session that led to his greatest hit:</u> <u>"I Like It Like That."</u> It took <u>a combined effort</u> by <u>EVERYBODY in the studio</u> to <u>give Pete the chance to be great</u>.

Likewise, it's going to take <u>a combined effort</u> <u>by EVERYBODY here</u> to help give <u>ALL</u> of our <u>Hispanic</u> and <u>Latino</u> team members <u>the chance to be great</u>.
